

Course Title: ARH 141 Western Art to 1400

Course Description:

This course surveys western painting, sculpture, and architecture from prehistory through

the Gothic period. We will focus on turning points in the historical narrative including the

early river valley civilizations of Mesopotamia and Egypt, the great Greek, Roman, and

Byzantine empires, the rise of Christianity, Islam, and the early humanism that eventually

leads to the modern world. Students will be able to recognize the basic techniques of

western art to identify major artistic styles and movements.

Learning Outcomes:

By the end of the course, the student should be able to:

A. Explain the historical development of western art, mainly from the Ancient World to

the Middle Ages;

B. Describe specific works of art, architecture and design, and analyse them through clear

and well-constructed arguments.

C. Demonstrate a broad knowledge and understanding of the cultural, social, political and

economic context within which specific works of art and architecture have been produced..

D. Make use of a range of art historical texts, art theory, criticism and documentary

sources, to develop informed critical responses and personal opinions.

Description of the Evaluation tasks:

There will be mid-term exam/ final exam for the course. They are the basic criteria for the evaluation of students' learning outcomes and final grade.
