

Course Title: ARH 344 Italian Renaissance Art

Course Description:

This course offers historical survey of the painting, sculpture, and architecture from the fourteenth century through the seventeenth century in Italy. After completion, you will be able to identify major works of art from this era, describe the stylistic characteristics of different artistic centers, and explain key theoretical concepts surrounding the creation of art and architecture during the Italian Renaissance.

- A. Use critical reasoning skills to analyze visual objects and architecture by imposing art historical analytical tools;
- B. Describe the visual, architectural, and cultural history of Renaissance Italy;
- C. Discuss contextual knowledge of the social, cultural, historical, political and economic factors that shape artist's decisions regarding subject matter, symbolism, and style when creating a new object;
- D. Recognize works by the principal protagonists of the Renaissance age in Italy and understand why they are significant for the history of art.

Description of the Evaluation tasks:
