

Course Title: PSY 227 Introduction To Personality

Course Description:

This course will familiarize students with theories and topics in personality including its development, measurement, research, and behavior-change techniques. We will also explore the nature, ideas of the most significant psychologists and applications of each personality theory. Taking the course can help students increase their self-knowledge, make better decisions, and live more fulfilling lives.

Learning Outcomes:

By the end of the course, the student should be able to:

- A. Understand, analyze and apply the basic theories and concepts of personality;
- B. Explain personality-related processes underlying individual behavioral differences;
- C. Describe the nature and main ideas of each personality theory.
- D. Identify the strengths and weaknesses of each evaluation methods used in the study of personality;
- E. Examine seminal and current researches studying and describing important findings in the fields of personality;
- F. Apply major personality theories to understand human behavior and build on sound foundation for deeper learning.

Description of the Evaluation tasks:

<u>Assignment/ Essay/ ... :</u> During the term, students will be required to finish several evaluation tasks within due date. There will be mid-term exam/ final exam for the course. They are the basic criteria for the evaluation of students' learning outcomes and final grade.

During the class time, students are encouraged to make use of all relevant online course resources and communicate with the instructor. Students' grades are accumulated based on the cumulative evaluations.
