

**Course Title: PSY 340 Child And Adolescent Development**

**Term: Summer 2023**

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**Course Description:**

This course covers human development from conception through adolescence. We will explore models of physical, language, cognitive, emotional, personality, and social development within the multiple contexts of family, peer group, community and school. The purpose of the course is to apply developmental theory to child observations, surveys and using investigative research methodologies.

- C. Analyze the contributions and limitations of research in the field of child development;
- D. Understand the interrelationships among physical, cognitive, social and personality development;
- E. Be aware of both the commonality and diversity of today's multicultural society.

**Description of the Evaluation tasks:**
