

Course Title: ARH 142 Western Art since 1400

**Mode of Instruction: Online** 

## **Course Description:**

This course surveys western painting, sculpture, and architecture from the Renaissance to the present time. Topics include a variety of art forms in different historical periods. Students will learn to appreciate the art works in journals, museums and galleries and understand their significance, as well as build up connections among art works, the western civilizations of different historical eras, and the social, geographical, political and cultural existence by learning this course.

#### **Description of the Evaluation tasks:**
