

Course Title: REL 150 Religions Of The World

Course Description:

This course provides a clear and concise introduction to the major world religions. Students will learn about the people, places, practices and philosophies shaping today's events. After exploring the religions that have shaped history, civilizations and the next door neighbors views, students will learn about the founders, the history and essential teachings of each of these major religions: Hinduism, Christianity, Judaism, Buddhism, Islam, Confucianism, and Taoism, plus brief descriptions of other religions and religious practices.

- B. Define, summarize, and analyze the major similarities and differences between various religious worldviews;
- C. Use critical thinking methods appropriate to the interpretation and appraisal of religious ideas to analyze and evaluate the ways in which various religions approach life and its problems;
- D. Locate, evaluate, and use effectively information from a variety of relevant sources;

- E. Participate actively in discussions of religious ideas and issues.

Description of the Evaluation tasks:

There will be mid-term exam/ final exam for the course. They are the basic criteria for the evaluation of students' learning outcomes and final grade.

During the class time, students are encouraged to make use of all relevant online course resources and communicate with the instructor. Students' grades are accumulated based on the cumulative evaluations.
